# May 18, 2024: Members only plant sale

What goes around, comes around. Yes, it's almost time for our annual spring plant sale and there are sure to be some great plants for everyone! As for the last few years, we've elected to keep this sale is for members only on Saturday, May 18. We'll be at the same large pavilion at Myers Park, near the marina (be prepared for whatever weather Mother Nature chooses to deliver that day. Note: Unless you are a resident of the Town of Lansing, the park charges admission of \$7 per car.

You should be potting up plants to bring, though contributing plants is certainly not a requirement to attend. We need buyers too and our plants will be priced to sell. It's good to be reminded that the sale supports our speaker program and plant-of-the-month. Have a friend who might be interested too? Bring them along, please. We may be a rock garden club but the plant selection is by no means limited to rock garden plants. We receive donations of everything from familiar perennials for sun or shade, to woodland plants, trees and shrubs, houseplants, and usually a "free" table too. More rare plants or those priced more than \$8 go on the silent auction table. As a gardener friend once told me, "You should buy the plants you don't know."

Volunteers: Every year we count on folks to help with set-up at 9a.m., cashiering, and clean-up. Let me know if you're willing to step up. (carolithaca@gmail.com)

Lunch: After clean-up we will enjoy a dish-to-pass lunch together. The chapter will provide beverages. Remember to bring your own table setting!

Here's the schedule for May 18th

- 9:00 a.m. Set-up begins at Pavilion B at Myers Park, Lansing
- 10:00 a.m. Plan to arrive if you are bringing plants

- 10:30 a.m. Sale begins no earlier than 10:30 (if we are ready earlier, you will have a chance to peruse the offerings and socialize, if we need a bit more time, we will start the sale later
- 12:00 p.m. Sale concludes, cashier opens to take your payment, and clean-up begins (with lots of helpers this will go fast); if we finish earlier, we eat earlier!
- 12:30 Dish-to-Pass, relax, socialize. No rush. We have reserved the pavilion for the whole day.

Advanced Logistics: Have you started potting up plants yet? Now is the time. We ask that you remove what soil you can and pot into soil-less potting mix. We decided not to take any extra precautions to address the jumping worm issue. (Buyer beware: if you do not have jumping worms in your garden, we suggest bare rooting any plant purchases before setting them out in your garden). Label your plants in advance please.

#### Consider:

- · Try to bring plants that are not so common (granted that is not so easy to determine)
- · Bring small numbers of a species (suggested 3-5)
- · Special plants should be placed on the bid table.
- · Label your plants in advance Latin name and common name (if known)
- · If you are not able to attend, please consider donating plants anyway and asking a fellow member to bring them.

Day of Sale Logistics: As you arrive, we ask that you first place the plants that you bring on the staging tables and then onto the appropriate tables, with signage indicating alphabetical order. Our sale procedure will be essentially the same as previous years (please refer to May 2022 Green Dragon at acnargs.org newsletter archives). To summarize briefly we call people up by order of arrival on the signup sheet (don't forget to sign-in) and allow limited selections. That way we hope everyone gets a chance at their first-choice plants. After several "limited choice" rounds, the sale is opened up to all.

Directions to Myers Park and the Pavilion Take 34B (whether approaching from the north or south). Before the bridge over Salmon Creek, turn onto Myers Road, towards the lake. If you miss the turn, this road forms a loop so it intersects 34B again after you cross the bridge. The entrance to Myers Park is ahead at the stop sign on Myers Road. You will cross the railroad tracks. Pavilion B is located near the marina with ample parking available.

There's lots to anticipate. Will Frank bring his entourage from Scranton again? I hope so!



### FOLLOW-UP ON APRIL PRESENTATION

While Janet Allen's April presentation, "The Little Things that Run the World" focused on the fascinating interrelationship between insects and plants, her broader message is that the future of mankind depends on insects and the many functions that they serve. Hence, it behooves us to be more mindful of the plants we select to grow in our gardens.

In case you haven't gotten the message, we should be incorporating more native plants, preferably not the cultivars, into our gardens. It's a huge

challenge on a global scale and difficult to understand how one person can make a difference. Visiting Janet's garden, as we will on June 8, offers the evidence.

While few gardeners would be as dedicated as Janet is, she does serve as an inspiration. Not only has she converted her property to natives, she has become a strong advocate and activist through her speaking engagements and organizational work. She offered many resources to commit to our own learning process. Two websites that she recommended, that include a wealth of information, are a good place to explore, especially on a rainy day.

Habitat Gardening of Central New York (https://wildones.org/chapters/new-york/) is the local chapter of the parent organization, Wild Ones. This Chapter serve multiple counties including Tompkins County. Join their mailing list to receive their newsletter and calendar. Their YouTube channel includes recordings of past programs. The second resource is Janet's personal website located at https://ourhabitatgarden.org/. She says she has created over 300 pages. Janet mentioned many other web resources as well, which your own explorations and interests will no doubt lead you to discover.

Resources on native plants abound in Tompkins County too. For starters, check out the Finger Lakes Native Plant Society (website flnps.org - a wealth of information) and the Tompkins Pollinator Pathway (https://blogs.cornell.edu/tompkinspollinatorpathway/partner-organizations/), of which the latter, like Habitat Gardening of Central New York and ACNARGS, is part of a national affiliate.
